



\$100 Million Investment of Federal Funding for Broadband Access

Gov. Tony Evers announced on Tuesday, May 18th that the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin (PSC) will launch a round of broadband expansion funding with \$100 million in funding from the federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). This is the initial batch of federal funds to be dedicated to expanding high-speed broadband internet across the state. Funding will be awarded by the PSC based on a model similar to the successful Broadband Expansion Grant Program.

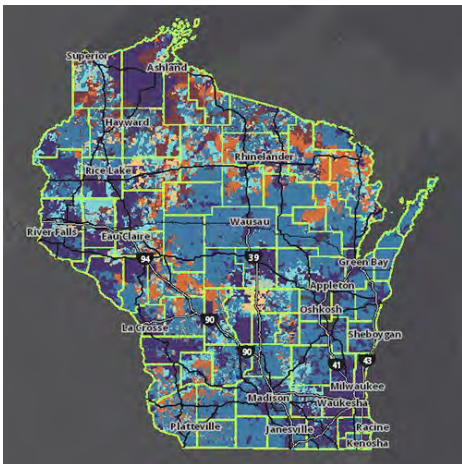
Applications and information will be available June 1, 2021 and due on July 27, 2021

Under U.S. Treasury guidance for the ARPA funds, eligible broadband projects are expected to:

- Serve unserved or underserved households and businesses.
- Be designed to deliver upon project completion internet service that reliably meets or exceeds upload and download speeds of 100 Mbps or at least 100 Mbps download and at least 20 Mbps upload if it not practicable to deliver the higher upload speeds due to geography, topography, or excessive costs.
- Prioritize projects that deliver a physical broadband connection that achieve the last mile connection.
- Prioritize affordability options.
- Prioritize investments in fiber optic infrastructure where feasible.
- Avoid investments in locations that have existing agreements to build reliable service of at least 100 Mbps download and 20 Mbps upload by December 31, 2024.

Wisconsin Broadband Map 2021: New Features



For those not familiar with the [Wisconsin Broadband Map \(WBM\)](#), this interactive tool, prepared by Wisconsin Broadband Office (WBO), serves two functions. First, it displays areas of advertised internet access in Wisconsin, which helps to understand the current internet coverage in the State by type of technology and provider, with coverage data based on 2020 access data submitted from internet service providers and from the [FCC's form 477](#). Second, this map displays areas related to the Wisconsin Broadband Expansion Grant program to identify grant eligible and priority areas.

To support the Governor's Ever commitment to make 2021 the **Year of Broadband Access** and to align the map with the State Broadband plan, the WBM was revamped on May 12, 2021. Regarding the coverage depiction, two new features were added. 1) The *Fixed Internet Speeds* new layer is active

by default once opening the map, which shows all in one the download AND upload speeds for both Wireline and Fixed Wireless technologies. The new layer supports the familiar four independent layers for each fixed terrestrial technology speed, which are still available. 2) The second new coverage feature is a *new set of categories and colors* to displays internet speeds; first is the addition of two separate speed categories, the *100+ Mbps Download / 20+ Mbps Upload* (in dark purple), and the *No Known Internet Coverage* (in dark red), which displays areas with no internet infrastructures other than satellite, and areas with sparse or no population. The colors representing the very low speed categories colors are now displayed in tan and bright orange using a 5 Mbps cut-off.

Regarding the Broadband Expansion Grant Guideline content, two new features were added; the former eligibility single layer is now displayed into three separate layers by status. And the grant eligibility color scheme now uses a red color scheme. We hope the revamped WBM will provide a more consistent color scheme, a better understanding of the internet coverage in the State, and a simplified usage of the map for the public and the Commission.

A High-Speed Future: Evaluating the Broadband Expansion Grant Program

The Wisconsin Broadband Office had the unique opportunity to work with a group of graduate students from the La Follette School of Public Affairs for their capstone project. The Wisconsin Broadband Office asked the students to determine the economic and social impacts of the Broadband Expansion Grant Program in Wisconsin. This analysis was conducted by examining the spread of grant funds throughout Wisconsin, the types of technologies employed in these funded projects, and the equity and access made available to residents in terms of geographic and social distinctions. In performing this evaluation, the student team conducted stakeholder interviews, conducted two surveys, and analyzed PSC and Census data.

This study was done in partnership with the Wisconsin Broadband Office, however the data, research and recommendations are the independent work of the students under the guidance of Professor Timothy Sneeding and not the work of the Wisconsin Broadband Office or the Commission.

Emergency Broadband Benefit has Launched



The FCC's Emergency Broadband Benefit program started enrolling households on May 12th – it's the new benefit program to help families and households struggling to afford internet service. The program provides up to \$50 per month towards broadband service for eligible households (\$75 on qualifying tribal lands), and in some cases up the opportunity to purchase a device for a small co-payment.

Consumers can enroll in one of three ways: (1) by contacting a participating provider, (2) enrolling on-line at [GetEmergencyBroadband.org](https://www.getemergencybroadband.org), or (3) by calling 1-833-511-0311 for a paper application. Broadband providers can still enroll to participate in the program. The FCC has also made

The benefit is temporary and will end when program funds are exhausted, or six months after the Department of Health and Human Services declares an end to the pandemic, whichever comes first.

Federal Funding Information - Updates

Consolidated Appropriation Act, 2021

Tribal Broadband Connectivity Grants, National Telecommunication and Information Administration, \$1 billion for tribal governments and organizations to expand broadband adoption and deployment on tribal lands, as well as to support distance learning, remote work, and telehealth during the COVID-19 pandemic. This grant is not open yet, it will have a 90 day application period.

Broadband Infrastructure Deployment Grants, National Telecommunication and Information Administration, \$300 million for state-and-provider partnerships to support broadband infrastructure deployment to areas lacking broadband, especially rural areas.

This grant is open for applications. Grants will be awarded to partnerships between a state, or political subdivisions of a state, and providers of fixed broadband service.

NTIA's Broadband Infrastructure Program was established by the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021. In the priority order defined by the Act, NTIA will accept applications for projects that are designed to:

1. Provide broadband service to the greatest number of households in an eligible service area;
2. Provide broadband service to rural areas;
3. Be most cost-effective in providing broadband service; or
4. Provide broadband service with a download speed of at least 100 Mbps and an upload speed of at least 20 Mbps.

Grants are due August 17, 2021

Coronavirus Capital Projects Fund, Department of the Treasury, \$10 billion for capital projects directly enabling work, education, and health monitoring, including remote options, in response to the public health emergency. [Statement of purpose and process.](#)

Emergency Connectivity Fund. Federal Communication Commission, \$7.2 billion for E-Rate support to reimburse schools and libraries for provision of eligible equipment and advanced telecommunications and information services during the pandemic, including for locations other than schools and libraries.

Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds, \$219.8 billion for states, \$45.6 billion
