

# Commission Announces BEAD Local Planning, Workforce Planning and Digital Equity Outreach Grants



The Commission is now accepting applications for multiple federally-funded grant programs to assist in the state's broadband and digital equity planning efforts in preparation for federal funds.

The 'Internet for All' initiative includes the Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) Program and Digital Equity Program. Both programs will help build broadband infrastructure and promote digital equity in the state. The federally-funded, state-administered planning grant programs now open are the BEAD Workforce Planning Grant, the Digital Equity Outreach Grant; more information will soon be available regarding the BEAD Local Planning Grant.

#### **Digital Equity Outreach Grant**

The <u>Digital Equity Outreach Grant</u> will provide funding to trusted partners to collect locally-informed insights into barriers to internet access for Wisconsin residents. Digital Equity Outreach activities may include, but are not limited to, interactive workshops, surveys, townhall discussions, data collection, and interviews with impacted residents. The outreach results will inform the statewide digital equity plan. A total of \$335,000 in funding is available for this grant program. **Applications are due March 1, 2023 at 1:30pm CT**. The Commission will host a webinar on February 9, 2023

#### **BEAD Workforce Planning Grant**

As part of Wisconsin's BEAD plan, the State must prepare a plan to ensure that a highly skilled workforce is trained and available to build and maintain proposed broadband infrastructure investments. The <u>Workforce Planning Grant</u> will engage existing entities to plan workforce development strategies, map assets, conduct stakeholder engagement, and review policy and funding models to develop solutions that will best prepare the state for broadband infrastructure funding, as well as ensuring that all Wisconsinites have a pathway to these career opportunities. A total of \$100,000 in funding is available for this grant program. **Applications are due March 1, 2023 at 1:30pm CT.**

#### **BEAD Local Planning Grant**

Counties and Tribes are well positioned to understand the need, vision, and barriers related to successful deployment of high-speed internet. BEAD Local Planning formula grants will offer resources to counties and Tribes to participate in broadband planning. The resulting local broadband planning will inform the basis of Wisconsin's Five-Year Action Plan for broadband. BEAD Local Planning Grants are non-competitive formula grants that will be allocated to each county and Tribe that opts into the program. A total of \$1.5 million in funding is available for this grant program. **Applications are due March 7, 2023 at** 

1:30pm CT.

# FCC Broadband Map and Badgering the FCC



A huge thank you to all the communities, local governments, and Wisconsin residents that reviewed and submitted challenges as needed to the new <u>FCC national broadband map</u>. Together we **Badgered the FCC**. This continued work will help our state improve our broadband data and secure more federal funding to expand reliable, affordable broadband for all.


The initial draft version of the FCC's National Map shows:

- There are approximately 2,300,000 locations (i.e. residential and businesses) that broadband serviceable locations in Wisconsin
- Of the total 220,000 locations are unserved as defined by the BEAD program, they
  have service of less than 25/3 Mbps, only unlicensed fixed wireless of any speed, or
  no service.
- Of the total 300,000 locations are underserved as defined by the BEAD program, they lack access to service of 100/20 by a wireline or licensed fixed wireless provider.

The Wisconsin Broadband Office worked diligently to evaluate the FCC map on both individual locations and by reviewing provider and FCC methodologies. The WBO cast a wide net in our approaches to the FCC challenge in order to maximize our opportunities to validate reporting, improve the map, and maximize the BEAD allocation for Wisconsin. Given the the rules outlined in the federal DATA act, the challenge process is the only path for states to remedy potential errors in the national broadband map.

In addition to the robust local participation, the Wisconsin Broadband Office successfully submitted **260,966 challenges to internet service availability** using the bulk challenge process.

While the initial January 13 challenge submission is in the past, improving the map is an ongoing effort and important to our continued broadband planning and local coordination. We still encourage individuals to <u>Badger the FCC</u> on an ongoing basis.



## **Broadband Expansion Grants Due February 22nd**

The <u>State Broadband Expansion Grant Program</u> is currently accepting applications through **February 22**, **2023 at 1:30 pm CT**.

In this grant round, \$14.1 million is available to applicants to help expand high-speed broadband Internet to unserved and underserved areas in the state. An applicant in the FY 2023 grant cycle is required to submit the application using the new online PSC Grants System. Applicants must also submit geospatial data by the February 22 deadline.

## **More Grant Opportunities**

#### **Nonprofit Access Grant**

The <u>Nonprofit Access Grant Program</u> is currently accepting applications. The application period runs through **March 1, 2023 at 1:30 pm CT**.

The Commission may award up to \$500,000 in grants under this program for a two-year performance period. The Nonprofit Access grant enables nonprofit groups to apply for partial funding of programs or projects that will facilitate affordable access to telecommunications.

#### **Lifeline Outreach Grant**

The <u>Lifeline Outreach Grant Program</u> is currently accepting applications. The application period runs through **March 1, 2023 at 1:30 pm CT.** 

The Commission may award up to \$250,000 in grants under this program. The Lifeline Outreach Grant enables eligible entities to apply for funding of programs, projects, research or resources that will assist low-income customers to obtain affordable access to essential telecommunications through the Lifeline program.

## **Support for Broadband Planning**

The Public Service Commission is pleased to announce that <u>UW Extension</u> and Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation's <u>Office of Rural Prosperity (ORP)</u> will be serving as technical assistance partners for communities seeking support in broadband planning activities as part of developing the BEAD 5-year broadband action plan and the Wisconsin Digital Equity Plan.

Over the coming months UW Extension will host workshops, webinars and provide tools for communities, local broadband champions and regional economic development organizations. The first webinar is listed below.

UW Extension will be focused on support for counties and local governments and the Office of Rural Prosperity will be focused on support for Regional Economic Development Organizations. ## Broadband Benefit Programs are Helping to Close the Digital Divide

Recently released data from the American Community Survey shows substantial increases in household wireline broadband adoption from 2019 to 2021—an increase of more than twice the rate of growth compared to the 2017-to-2019 interval. This suggests that pandemic-driven initiatives to address home adoption gaps have had an impact. Notably, increases in home broadband subscriptions have been most pronounced in cities with higher-than-average rates of poverty.
