




Session 2: Digital Navigators - Panelists









• Adele Edwards is the Chief Information Officer for the City of Racine. In 2022, she convened the Digital Divide Roundtable (DDR) which is comprised of close to 60 social services, workforce, and educational institutions committed to closing the digital divide in Racine. American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding enabled implementation of digital navigation services at many DDR locations starting in early 2024. The Racine Public Library, a DDR member, led the first annual Digital Literacy Fair in the Fall of 2024, and with funds from the Wisconsin Public Service Commission Digital Connectivity and Navigators grant we are now providing refurbished computers and training to 460 low-income Racine residents.



Session 3: Coalition Building - Panelists









- Jessica Hatch is the Door County Broadband Coordinator, where she plays a key role in leading broadband expansion efforts in Door County, Wisconsin. In this position, she acts as a dedicated leader and champion for the county's broadband strategy, facilitating collaboration among local governments, internet service providers, and community organizations to improve internet connectivity. Her work supports the implementation of broadband initiatives that are critical for economic development, education, healthcare, and overall quality of life in the region. Hatch helps coordinate efforts to secure grant funding and local investments to build a federated broadband network, addressing the county's connectivity challenges and promoting digital inclusion.
- Katherine Merton, PhD, MBA, serves as the head of Health Equity Innovation Platform (HEIP), where she is focused on catalyzing innovative solutions that address disparities in healthcare access, outcomes and delivery. HEIP fosters partnerships across sectors to develop scalable models that advance health equity and value-based care. Katherine is an accomplished healthcare executive and innovation leader with a proven track record of driving strategic growth and transformation across the healthcare ecosystem. With a deep academic foundation and business acumen, Katherine has held impactful roles at leading organizations including Johnson & Johnson and Anthem, where she led initiatives at the intersection of science, technology, and patient-centered care.
- Cheryl Isabell is Covering Wisconsin's Community Engagement Lead and a Licensed Health Insurance Navigator serving Milwaukee County and Southeast Wisconsin. Having worked as a Human Services Professional for over a decade, she is passionate in community outreach and relentless in her efforts to assure that affordable health insurance coverage, health insurance literacy and health equity is accessible for all Wisconsin residents. Over the last year, Cheryl engaged with approximately 9500 people at 110 events, personally making sure they each had information on how to get covered or keep their coverage.
